

erim Moderator Letter

Dear Friends,

We are now well into 2019 and there has been considerable progress in the life of the Church. You are now officially linked with St Ayle. A Nominating Committee has been formed. They have the task of seeking a minister, a Sole Nominee, for the congregations to hear. The Nominating Committee has met and placed an advertisement in the Life and Work magazine. Your vacancy has been listed on the Church of Scotland's web site. By the time you read this, the Life and Work with your advertisement will be published and a Parish Profile providing information about the congregations and parishes will be available on your and St Ayle church web sites for enquirers to see.



The Nominating Committee has to work in the strictest confidence. Please do not ask them questions or try to get information from them. They really must not discuss what they are doing or whom they are considering.

However there is much that you can do. Please pray for the committee as they do their work. They need God's guidance and wisdom and will be really appreciative if you are praying for them. And pray too for the applicants whom they consider. They too need to know and sense that God is leading them. Please pray that the right applicant for Crail and St Ayle will be led to your committee and that your Nominating Committee will be led to them. Your Committee has to pray and work. We have to pray and wait.

There are great encouragements also. Both Kirk Sessions are working well together. Your Nominating Committee is working well. Both congregations are in good heart and are very positive. And both your worship teams are making really valuable contributions to your worship. Be encouraged too, for the future of the Church is in the hands of God.

In the Letter to the Hebrews in the Bible, the writer encourages his readers to be positive. They lived in very difficult, sometimes dangerous, and rapidly changing times. They took part, for the first time, in the non-competitive community choir section and received the following very complimentary feedback from the adjudicator for their 4 songs:

There is Peace (Such an attentive group of singers. Such a gentle and focussed start to your programme. No hesitation here - because you are watching your conductor so closely you are all so together with your phrasing and well held long notes. Your faces are a joy to watch.)

Surfin' USA (Well balanced harmonies- you have a lot of articulation here and you manage it well. Even shorter words would make this even clearer.)

Streets of London (A favourite of mine that I haven't heard for a long time. A very thoughtful performance. Warm tone when singing in 3 parts. I loved the section where altos and men descended under the melody. Well done.)

The Crail Song written specially for us by Finn Anderson (How wonderful to have your own song and sung in your own voices.) You should be very proud of your performance tonight. It may be your first visit here at the festival but please "haste ye back" and we will see you again. Lovely balance between men and girls. A well prepared programme with integrity, heart and commitment. Well done to your conductor and accompanist.

As well as singing themselves, the choir were able to watch the 8 other choirs whose sizes and choices of music were very varied. Everyone in the choir agreed that, although very apprehensive at first, it was a really enjoyable evening and are now looking forward to

another successful year. Rehearsals held Monday Evenings in Crail Town Hall (Crail Church hall the last Monday of the month). Any new singers will be made most welcome.

The Rotary Club of Anstruther

The Rotary Club of Anstruther would like to say thank you to everyone who supported our now-traditional Christmas postal delivery service, which took place once again to raise money for local, national and international charities and good causes. Thank you - just under £3,000 was raised - and general fitness levels were much improved by the excercise!!

Our club choir has also been out and about with performances in Arncroach, Pittenweem, St Monans and Kilrenny including a carol concert in Kilrenny Church. More appearances are in the diary including Crail.

The club's next big venture is again the Charity Coastal Path Walk - taking place this year on Sunday 12th May. The walk starts and finishes in Crail, where ample off-road parking is provided and there is free coach transport to starting points of Earlsferry or Anstruther. There is the choice of 6 or 13 miles along a well-signposted route with manned checkpoints. A warm welcome, refreshments and a commemorative certificate and medal await at the finish why not give it a try?

Since it started, the coastal walk has raised a brilliant total of £116,529 for registered charities. A total of 22 charities benefited last year and the charities

are chosen by the walkers themselves. More information and an entry form is available on the club website at www.rotaryanstruther.org

### Crail Food Festival

Our AGM was well attended and we heard of a very successful event in 2018. Our Events Manager, Aadam, gave FOOD an illustrated talk on the outcome of an event that was our best ever. A new



format, adding Beechwalk Park to our venues proved very special, helped, of course by the fine weather. Our attendance of over 5,500 was the biggest yet and there were a lot of smiling faces! Treasurer Peter gave a full explanation of the funding situation. Retiring chairman, Bruce Geddes summed up our problem of lack of local committee members. Two other members, Pat and David, were also due to retire but have agreed to stay on until the end of September to help the festival committee re-establish itself. We are delighted that Catriona and Sophie volunteered at the meeting to come on to the committee and David Jerdan agreed to be Chairman on an interim basis.

The interim committee (David J, David M. Pat, Annie, Sophie and Catriona, ably assisted by Aadam) have already met to arrange a small event this year. Peter remains as treasurer. Crail Food Festival 2018 was financially the most successful festival in its 8 year history. This was due to a number of factors - a dedicated Festival Committee who began planning for the 2018 Festival in October 2017, a professional event manager who worked tirelessly to create not only a well run event but almost singlehandedly obtained just under £20,000 in Grants & Sponsorship (2017 £3000) and doubled the income from stall holders.

The work done by our PR and Social Media professionals was also exemplary. Ticket sales (£20,000) doubled from 2017 - 2016 and 2017 were loss making and badly affected by the poor weather. Once everything had been settled, we had a healthy £25,000 in the bank. Future events require a substantial opening bank balance, but the committee decided to make donations of £1,700 to First Responders, £250 to Fisheries Museum and £150 to musicians. We are also giving Crail Charrette £5,000 to help fund a worthwhile project that will come from the charrette process. The committee is very grateful to all those that assisted in our festival last year and help us to gain several prestigious awards for 2018. We have had to take a bit of a breather this year, while we rebuild the committee, however, we are delighted to say that we will have a much smaller event for one day on Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> June. We will give much more detail very shortly in Crail Matters. We still need one or two local people to join our hard working committee - it is good fun as well!

Crail Charrette

Crail Community Charrette is going from strength to strength as over 70 people contributed to its developing plan for the future of the town at its second workshop. Building on last May's public visioning workshop, the charrette team prepared a range of approaches and options to deliver the vision which residents commented on.

The aim of the Charrette is to create a blueprint to help shape and focus energy for initiatives, projects, future development and government policy, which will tackle Crail's challenges: fragile businesses and services, retaining families & young people, an ageing population and housing development.

Charrette organisers Crail Community Partnership have been determined to get everyone on aboard a sustained process of engagement, which began in a public visioning workshop last May. They include a raft of voluntary groups in Crail, as well as individual residents of all ages, landowners and senior officials in Fife Council's planning and community development departments.

The second workshop has been accompanied by a Monday to Saturday drop-in centre at Crail Town Hall, and was repeated on a Wednesday night for those who couldn't make the Saturday event.

A third workshop on 16 March will focus on establishing initiatives to deliver the strategy options agreed on Saturday. This will take the form of "hard" proposals, including a masterplan for the future development and/or growth of Crail and public realm improvements to key streets and spaces, combined with "soft" proposals for events, initiatives and community organisation.

The Crail Charrette has been awarded £25,000 from the Scottish Government Making Places Scheme and £23,520 from Crail Common Good. It is part of the Scottish Government's initiative in encouraging communities in Scotland to assume an increasingly important role in planning their future.

Workshop 3 will take place in Crail Community Hall on 16<sup>th</sup>March from 10am-12pm.

Planning for this year's Festival is now at a very advanced stage; and we are very optimistic that а varied, entertaining, exciting programme will have broad appeal. The Festival will run from 17-27 July in the usual locations around the village. The Putting Green, providing great fun for all the family, will not only be open 22 June -16 August but also the weekends 1-2 June; 8-9 June and 15-1 June. The ambitious target this summer is 5000 putting rounds to set a new record. Other dates for busy diaries-Box Office will be open in the Golf Hotel 10.00-13.00 on Saturday 8 June and also on 15 June. Saturday Online ticket sales will begin am Sunday 16 June.

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Children's activities are rightly accorded a high priority at every Crail Festival. The Afternoon at the Movies (film yet to be confirmed!) will provide relaxation and fun on the first afternoon. The ever popular workshops include Drama, Art, Potter Harry Potion/Slime, Krafty Kids and Paper Making. All those who are

competitive will relish taking part in the Sandcastle, Crabbing, Rock Stacking and Bake Off competitions and the Scavenger Hunt. Archery and Falconry, in response to popular demand, feature again. It is always worth booking early for the Junior Golf Skills, Rock Pool Guddle, Fossil Hunt, Story Telling and Zoolab.

Musical events this year include keenly anticipated The Blueswater, after last year's superb performance, need no introduction. Blazin' Fiddles, a group of the hottest fiddle players mixed with piano and guitar, will bring the best traditional music to Crail. Cat Loud's cabaret style with forthright stage banter must not be missed. Ali Affleck and The Copper Cats will perform sensational New Orleans Jazz and Blues. The Scottish folk scene is vibrant so the Crail Folk Club Concert will be an outstanding evening. Michael Christian Durrant, a hugely talented, accomplished classical guitarist, makes a very welcome return, this time to the Community Hall. Our closing headline act will be the fabulous Something Blue Live Band who will play everything from 60s

Soul classics right up to modern R and B hits. A chance to dance the night away!

The inimitable Les Barker, always a favourite at Crail, will entertain with his comedic poetry and very topical parodies of popular songs. A very funny man!

Live theatre is back with Illyria's outdoor performance of 'The Tempest' in the Castle Grounds. This will almost certainly be 'The Tempest' with a difference!

Our hardy annuals the Festival Quiz, Street Market, Adult Ceramic Workshop and, hopefully, the Art Exhibition add to the enjoyment of many.

At our School Council on Tuesday 29th January some of our P7s presented their STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) project. They spoke confidently about their Goblin Kit Car project including the skills they have been learning: communication, problem solving and co-operation. They also explained how they have been developing their literacy and numeracy skills. They also explained their next steps which included applying for different jobs to take the forward, fundraising, project completing their portfolio and taking their car to Cowdenbeath to participate in racing events with other primary schools across Fife. Our P7s showed our families the Goblin Kit Car so far. Everyone was very impressed!



We joined the global Safer Internet Day campaign to promote the safe and responsible use of technology. Coordinated in the UK by the UK Safer Internet Centre, Safer Internet Day took place on Tuesday 5th February with the theme 'Together for a better internet'. Celebrated in over 100 countries, Safer Internet Day saw hundreds of organisations right across the UK and globally join together to 'be the change' and help create a better internet.

Our P7 Digital Leaders of Learning planned different activities which promoted safe internet usage and led a whole school Assembly.

We would like to wish 3 of our P6 children lots of luck at the Big Book Brains Final on 25.02.19. This is a reading quiz for P6 pupils throughout Fife at The Rothes Hall in Glenrothes. The children will participate in 10 different rounds covering a variety of different genres and authors.

During January we started our Scots Focus. Our classes have considered the Social Subjects Experiences and Outcomes of People, Past Events and Societies and/or People, Place and Environment. Each class has focussed on a different aspect of our country's history and heritage including, Mary Queen of Scots, Golf, our landscape, Scottish native animals and famous landmarks. It has been lovely to walk around our school and to see our children participating in Scottish Country Dancing and to hear the sound of Scottish music, poetry recitals, singing and stories. The results of all our children's learning were shared at a special Scottish Showcase when our families joined us. Crail Museum

Crail Museum and Heritage Centre is run by a team of dedicated volunteers who work hard both behind the scenes and front of house to ensure your visit is an interesting and enjoyable one, to answer any queries you may have and hope that you leave with a sense of the history of this lovely wee town.

New exhibitions this year are:-

#### The Mural Monuments of Crail Churchyard

Crail Churchyard is remarkable for its Mural Monuments which in terms of numbers and quality are only rivalled by Greyfriars Churchyard in Edinburgh. However, they are now in desperate need of repair and conservation. Our Exhibition highlights the work done over the past 125 years by local people to record and repair the Monuments and shows the need to promote future conservation. Crail Preservation Society has recently had a detailed survey carried out and is seeking financial support to carry out the work.

The exhibition on the Royal Burgh is being remounted. There will be an addition to the Characters of Crail exhibition relating to the setting up of the Crail Preservation Society and of the Crail Museum 60 and 40 years ago respectively. The exhibitions on the Airfield 1918 – 1960 and the History of Golf will continue.

#### **Children's Corner**

An area in the Museum where you can have fun revisiting your childhood with a selection of toys and games from the past. Bring along your children/grandchildren and show them how you survived without computers, mobile phones and social media!



Last year the Guided Walks of the Burgh were extended to all Sundays whilst the Museum was open except Easter Sunday. This proved successful but for holiday makers who arrived on a Saturday or Sunday and left the following Saturday it was felt that they may miss out, therefore we are also going to try having Guided Walks on all Wednesdays when the Museum is open.

Remembrance 2018

On 11<sup>th</sup> November 2018, Crail remembered the 44 villagers who made the ultimate sacrifice during the First World War.

It was estimated that over 200 people attended the Service at the Crail War Memorial. Wreaths were laid by a broad range of organisations - Scouts Scotland, Fife Council, Crail Community Council, the Lieutenancy of Fife, the British Legion Women's Section, the Roman Catholic Community, Crail Primary School, Waid Academy, and 2 Private wreaths and the Royal Scots Dragoon Guards.

To commemorate all the fallen, the Community Council wanted an everlasting and meaningful way in which to commemorate those who lost their lives and set to raising money to purchase a commemorative bench. This was finally revealed after an official unveiling ceremony on Sunday, November 11, by 91-year-old local resident Jenny Brett during the remembrance service.

After the Act of Remembrance at the War memorial, a service was held in the Kirk. At the beginning of the service, the Union flag, The British Legion Flag and the Scouts flag were received by the Minister. During the Service, the names of the forty-four men associated with Crail who are named on the War Memorial were read out, either by a relative, or members of Crail Scouts.



It is important to thank all who helped prepare the Memorial area and contributed to the occasion, and to thank the Kirk Elders, Minister, Peter Neilson and Ellie Clayton who played the pipes.

## Johann Nepomuk Hummel (1778 – 1837)

was an Austrian concert pianist, dedicated composer, teacher, and conductor, happy family man and successful businessman, whose death in 1837 marked the end of the Classical music era. He was regarded in his own lifetime as one of the greatest composers in Europe, and likely its finest pianist, equal to, if not surpassing, Beethoven in renown as a concert pianist. Hummel's composing repertoire is widely considered to have bridged the Classical and Romantic musical eras between Mozart and Beethoven.

Hummel continued to develop a booming career as a virtuoso pianist, becoming enormously successful and touring widely. During an 1823 concert tour to Holland, Hummel discovered the pirating of his own music, and for the rest of his life worked diligently to protect the intellectual property of composers through the establishment of copyrighting, securing even a personal letter from Beethoven himself to that end.

Hummel has been overshadowed in this century by his colleagues with more familiar household names: Mozart, Beethoven, Haydn and Schubert – all of whom Hummel knew well and worked with personally - and Hummel finally is now making a well-deserved modern "comeback" as a vastly important late Classical composer.

An astounding child prodigy at age 8, Hummel was at the least an equal to these contemporary composers, becoming more successful in his own lifetime than any of them. He had lived with and been taught by Mozart, first performing in a Mozart concert at the tender age of 9. Hummel's own music was written to entertain, following his desire to live a contented and successful life, bringing pleasure to others through his music. He wrote to a student: "Your purpose is to touch the heart, to instil joy, to delight the ear." How well he succeeded.

The performance of Hummel's music by the Anstruther Philharmonic Society on 16<sup>th</sup> March in St.Ayles Church is dedicated to the memory of Dr.Alasdair Kennedy, a Pittenweem GP who was a devoted member of the APS from 1958 to 2014 and a past President, Vice-President, Committee member and an eventual Life Member. His wife Gill was also an APS chorister from 1997-2012.


Tickets are £10 from members or at the door. Children 12 and under enter free with paying adult.
